Bone

Retired Deputy SURVIVES **THE ODDS** In July 2015, Dave Lostaunau, 53, had what he thought was a bad and lingering headache. It turned out to be something much more serious: a hemorrhagic stroke. After being gone for a few hours, Dave's wife, Susie, returned home. She found Dave unconscious on the floor and immediately called 911. Dave was well-known to the emergency responders. In 2012, he retired after 29 years as a Kern County deputy sheriff and was still a reserve deputy. Officers and paramedics arrived within minutes of Susie's call. They rushed their friend to San Joaquin Community Hospital (SJCH), a Nationally Certified Stroke Center. "The doctor told me it was really bad," Susie says. Hemorrhagic stroke, which accounts for only about 13 percent of stroke cases, is caused by a blood vessel that ruptures and bleeds into the brain. Dave was rushed into surgery.

"It was a last-ditch effort," Susie says. "His chance of surviving was about 25 percent that first night."

But Dave did survive. And although he had a series of complications and needed two more surgeries, today he is recovering well—walking short distances with a cane, for example.

"We still have a long road ahead of us with rehabilitation, but God put the right people in the right place at the right time," Susie says.

"I'm incredibly grateful," Dave says. "At San Joaquin, I got the best care you can get anywhere in the world. Everyone treated me like family."

Meet Sassan Keshavarzi, MD

Medical Director, The Brain and Spine Institute at San Joaquin Community Hospital

When did you know you wanted to be a doctor?

A From age 7 or 8...and a surgeon specifically. It seemed like the most honorable way to spend my life. In my family, being a doctor is the most prestigious thing you can do, because it gives you the opportunity to serve many different people.

Why is it important to have brain and spine care in Bakersfield?

A l've had people in my own family who have had to drive more than 100 miles into Los Angeles to have surgery. A lot of people don't have the resources to do that. When your physician is out of the area, it also makes your follow-up care more difficult. It's important that we have physicians here, solving health care issues and ensuring the day-to-day quality of care is high.

What do you find most fulfilling in your work?

When I perform surgery for patients who otherwise may not have access. Being a physician gives me the opportunity to provide the same high-quality care for all my patients that I would give to my own family if they were in need.

What is your hometown?

Right now my hometown is Bakersfield. I've brought my mom to live here too. I've lived all over the world, but this is where I want to live indefinitely. It's the first time I haven't wished I was somewhere else.

Dr. Keshavarzi is a board-certified and fellowship-trained neurosurgeon, with a subspecialty in reconstructive spine surgery and scoliosis. Meet Francesca Hoehne, MD

Medical Director, The Breast Center at San Joaquin Community Hospital

You specialize in treating women with breast cancer. What made you choose this area of medicine?

A I feel called to take care of women with breast cancer—and their families. I make lasting connections with my patients. I continue to see them after their treatment is finished. It's so fulfilling to take cancer out of a patient, help her heal from the inside out and be part of her emotional healing.

You were practicing at a well-known hospital in Los Angeles. What made you return to Bakersfield?

A I did my residency in Bakersfield, and I met my husband here. Then I did my fellowship and went into private practice in Los Angeles. I came back to Bakersfield to serve the community. There wasn't a specialized breast surgeon here, and I felt it would be a unique opportunity to provide a new type of care to the community.

What's your personal mission as a doctor? To make a difference and help people. It's as simple as that. It's using my talents to help women through a really difficult time. I work with everyone as an individual. I enjoy identifying each of my patient's special needs... and bringing and guiding her through the whole process, from start to finish.

How are you working to change breast care in Kern County?

A I want to bring new oncology techniques to the community, but it goes beyond that. It's starting at the beginning, asking how can we better identify and help high-risk patients with the many options we have today, such as genetic testing and genetic counseling.

It's providing services from the moment a woman schedules her mammogram through treatment and then past that, with yoga, support groups, etc. It's also removing barriers to care and providing support, like transportation to and from

radiation or chemotherapy appointments, and help with finding wigs, mastectomy garments and other things. It's making sure patients have the best and most comprehensive care possible.

Francesca Hoehne, MD Medical Director, The Breast Center

Francesca Hoehne, MD, is a general surgeon specializing in the treatment of breast disease. She is one of the only female fellowship-trained breast surgeons in Kern County. Dr. Hoehne graduated from the **University of Chicago Pritzker** School of Medicine. She completed her residency at Kern **Medical Center in Bakersfield** and a breast surgery fellowship at the John Wayne Cancer Institute in Los Angeles. After time as a private practice breast surgeon at Huntington Memorial Hospital in Pasadena, Dr. Hoehne returned to Bakersfield in 2007.

BIONIC WOMAN'

In 1998, Lynne Edwards, of Bakersfield, fell and tore the cartilage that cushioned and stabilized both knees. Surgery to repair the damage left her with bone rubbing on bone. Her surgeon told Lynne she'd eventually need both knees replaced but encouraged her to wait. She was only 44, and at the time, most knee replacements lasted just 10 to 15 years.

Soon, the pain of bone-on-bone robbed Lynne of a normal life. She quit work. Barely able to walk, she crawled up the stairs in her house. Sunday school classmates in their 80s grabbed chairs for her because she couldn't stand. Her husband and son helped her with most everything.

"I never dreamt life could get so hard," Lynne says. "I've gone through cancer, but this was worse."

A new knee, a new life

Lynne endured the pain for more than 17 years. Finally, in December 2015, she had her right knee replaced by Thomas Ferro, MD, at San Joaquin Community Hospital (SJCH).

Just 15 minutes after being wheeled back into

her room after surgery, Lynne was walking, with the help of a walker and a physical therapist. Less than 24 hours later, she was climbing stairs. Three days after surgery she walked five blocks—all without pain.

"What a beautiful gift to be able to walk beside my husband again," she says. "I'll be able to dance at my son's wedding. I feel like a bionic woman."

Lynne plans to have her left knee replaced soon. She says: "I can't thank the staff at SJCH and Dr. Ferro enough. They've given me a new life."

Meet Thomas Ferro, MD

Medical Director, Orthopedics

Why did you choose orthopedics, and joint replacement, as a specialty?

When I did my training, I looked at what field would give me the ability to help people the most. I saw that orthopedics was exploding with new technology and techniques. Total joint replacements were starting to transform people's lives. Patients have been hurting for years, and after the surgery, suddenly they can go and walk with their families, or play tennis or ride a bicycle or play golf. It's truly a life-changing operation.

Why do you practice here?

A The people of Bakersfield want the best. San Joaquin Community Hospital's (SJCH) vision, which matches my vision, is to offer absolutely state-of-the-art services—the same care people would expect at the most premier facilities in the country. We're focused on using proven medical methods and practices so our patients get the very best in care.

Are you using new techniques for joint replacement surgery?

A Yes. It's not your parents' surgery anymore. For the last five years, my focus has been on short-stay joint replacements. We're able to send our patients home the next day, sometimes the same day with younger patients. We're using very minimally invasive techniques—that means smaller incisions with quicker recoveries.

What do you find most rewarding in your work?

A The absolute, most fulfilling thing is when I see patients after surgery and they tell me how it's changed their lives. There will be some big guy in there getting teary-eyed because he can go play ball with his kid. Or a woman who can dance again or do something she hasn't done in years. When patients do well, it's very satisfying.





Thomas Ferro, MD Medical Director, Orthopedics

Dr. Ferro is a board-certified, fellowship-trained orthopedic surgeon specializing in joint replacement. Dr. Ferro completed medical school, his internship and a research fellowship in orthopedic surgery at UC San Diego. He finished his residency at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque. He completed an additional fellowship in joint replacement and adult reconstructive surgery at the Anderson Orthopaedic Research Institute in Arlington, Virginia.


